weaker and lose it’s joy.




Tóim loved get loose in the air.

The first time hearing this made Tóim think it was a compliment, maybe some other way of being useful.


But having Lu crying about it felt wrong, so it started hiding from the wind, doing anything to remain small, accepting all those combs, shampoos and hair creams.




But one day it grew tired of being a small obedient hair. The same very day when the little girl said it was a BAD HAIR,

After all, that was the most rude thing someone could say to a such generous hair.






Grandma Flor let her hair down and showed

She taught her about long and short braids, about tereres, how to wear little shells, to do little hair buns, anything to make it look even more fantastic, showing how beautiful curly hair can be.



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Educational Content

How about following these tips to get to know a little more of your hair and doing activities with other kids? On the next pages you will find ways to having fun by learning!



Types of hair



1 Straight hair: they are usually more oily and with ease in reaching long lengths.



2 Waves: This one makes waves in a "S" shape. Often the waves appear in the middle area and towards the end.



3 Defined curls: the curls are more defined and make the hair bulky and thick. The scalp has a natural oil that goes through the hair, but in curly ones this process takes longer. As such, the middle areas and the ends can get dry very easily.



4 Curly bulky hair: these are more fragile. It gets dry a lot more easily so it's recommended to moist and hydrate more often. We can take care of them with hair butter and vegetal oils.

Taking care

We can follow the Hair Schedule to keep the hair soft and healthy.

HYDRATION:

It's very recommended to dry hair types. It's about replenishing the water in the strands. You should look for: fruits, glycerine, aloe vera, honey, sucrose and hydrolyzed proteins.

NUTRITION:

It helps replenishing the natural oils and nutrients. We should look for vegetal oils as such the avocado's, olive's, coconut's or castor's, butters and vegetal wax.

RECONSTRUCTION:

This process is indicated to damaged hair that breaks, falls off or has split ends. The products to achieve this are keratin and it's amino acids and collagen.

Storytelling

It is a way to present the message in a playful way and arouse children's interest in reading. This is the story of Lu, a girl who complained so much about her hair called Tóim that he ran away. When looking for help from her grandmother Flor, she learned about the beauty of curly hair, so when she finds Tóim, she apologizes and they become inseparable friends. Presenting the story opens the idea to question about each one of them, so it's very relevant to ask them which points were more interesting to the group. Teaching about the beauty of curly hair is a liberating tool in building children's identity and good self-esteem.

Make your own Tóim

This activity brings the reflection how children interpret their own hair and also collaborate the perception of their identity. Each child you will receive the materials to create a doll and her hair with beads and ornaments.

Methodology:

Filling the bladder with a funnel or top from the pet bottle, tie the bladder and decorate.

Materials:

Bladder, wheat flour, PET bottle or funnel, scissors, plastic eyes, marker, styrofoam glue and embellishments.





Draw your own Tóim

The workshop comes to build reflection and interpretation about the story. Each child will be given a blank paper and they'll draw their hair. After that, they'll utilize glue and beads to bring their idea of Tóim to life, the main character's hair.

Methodology:

- Making the first sketches with a pencil
- Utilizing the glue and the beads over the sketches

Materials Required:

Paper, Pen, Pencil, Scissors, colored pen, crayons, glue, string, beads, Shells, Ribbons, Colored fabric

Braiding Day

This activity is about giving children the possibility to find their own curly beauty. By making braids and other hairstyling on each child they will identify African traits and be able to recognize how beautiful they are. By the end, the catwalk intend to make them express themselves in a funny way.

Methodology:

- Sharing and exchanging ideas
- Making the hairdos
- Fashion catwalk

Materials Required:

Comb, hair elastic, hair clips, colored ribbons, braiding fiber, thick paper for molding, hair gel, colored spray, shiny spray, colored fabric, comb cream and red fabric for the catwalk.



Despite having a small name, Lu is a great girl that with her childish innocence she teaches us about ancestry, heritage and self love in a very soft way. Her hair named Toim, represents her identity and her roots. Being a partner to her adventures Tóim feels free to play and to be as big as the little girl's own beauty.

However, their relationship wasn't always this easy. For a while Lu faced a hard time accepting herself so she ended up in a fight with her hair. Toim reacted in a very unexpected way and to solve the problem Lu with grandma Flor come to realize in a delightful way something important and valuable.

This book was written and drawn by Tamires Lima, with lots of creativity and tenderness. Aiming to show us that every hair is beautiful, also that we should make peace with our own traits and how important and fundamental is to love ourselves as we are.

My true desire with this book is to help black girls to improve their self esteem and by translating this book I thank the author to share her experiences in a such inspiring way.
